## "I want to work harder for my N-Levels so that I don't disappoint my parents."

Nicholas* was first admitted to Boys' Town on a 12-month probation order. At 17, he was susceptible to negative peer pressure and often had difficulties expressing himself. Growing up, he had a distant relationship with his family.

In Boys' Town, Nicholas had to decide if he should retake his N-levels which he had fared poorly for, or to start working. After adjusting to his stay at a residential home, he shared with his Social Worker his desire to change and focus on his academics. To Nicholas, he views his probation order as a second chance to start over, and this chance came through Boys' Town Alternative Schooling (BTAS).

## Nicholas' Journey with BTAS

BTAS helps our residential boys who have been temporarily taken out from their regular schools due to behavioural issues, having missed school for a few years or are at-risk of dropping out etc. Lessons follow the mainstream school syllabus. At BTAS, our aim is to eventually reintegrate boys like Nicholas back to their schools.



To Nicholas' teachers at BTAS, he is inquisitive, motivated and shows initiative over his own education. They shared that he is a hardworking and diligent student. Nicholas feels grateful that BTAS gave him a second shot at taking his N -Levels and feels that the small class size and individualised curriculum greatly benefitted him.

Beyond BTAS, Nicholas shares a good relationship with the staff and the other boys and is often described as calm and good tempered. He would often play a brotherly figure, taking care of the younger boys and engaging them during activities.

## Scaling New Heights

Nicholas was eventually selected as the recipient of the "Best Improved in Academics" award for the year. Nicholas' results improved significantly after enrolling into BTAS and he has successfully secured a place in ITE. His Social Worker's wish is for him to continue growing as an individual and find courage to pursue his dreams.

Brother Roger Venne first joined the Montfort Brothers of St. Gabriel in 1945 when he was just 16 years old. With the skills of a professional tailor, he was called upon to join Boys' Town to start a tailoring section for the boys. Just like that, he boarded a ship from Canada and arrived in Singapore on 4


Teaching boys the art of tailoring March 1953. In Boys' Town, Bro Roger taught the boys how to make items such as mattresses, pillow, cushions, window curtains and school uniforms; producing them in the hundreds!

Bro Roger also supervised a dormitory and worked mostly with the younger boys. He often brought them out for activities such as picnics, football, softball, and swimming. His heart was always open to the boys in need, providing many of them with clothing to wear. Bro Roger was attached to Boys' Town for 33 years until he was given new responsibilities to look after the aged and sick Brothers.

What was your fondest memory as an old boy? From feeling angry about being sent here to the bond I've developed with the other boys and staff, learning drums and forming bands, to winning 'Boy of the Year' and graduating. There were so many fun memories in my four years as an old boy.

Do you see a difference between Boys' Town then and now?
Back then it was more regimental, with the focus being mainly on discipline. Today, Boys' Town focuses more on supporting our youths emotionally and helping them go through difficult issues in their lives as well.

Can you tell the readers about what you do as a Youth Worker at YouthReach?
Mainly case management, counselling and running programmes such as drama, music, soccer and fitness for the youths which is also how we help them work through their issues.

What do you love most about working with youths? I love the conversations. It is a privilege for me to hear their incredible stories of resilience - like working at a young age to take care of their families, as well as creating plans and actions to achieve their dreams for the future amidst their struggles. It is really rewarding to support the youths and watch them grow into wonderful people.

They go through similar or even more complex issues than we probably did as youths ourselves. Perhaps we could all begin with empathy and learn how we can be there for those that fall through the cracks. It really does take a village to raise a child.

## SANCTUARY CARE

Neethya* was 22 weeks pregnant when her community social worker reached out to Sanctuary Care. During which, she was experiencing an antepartum condition and had to be hospitalized for about a week so she could be treated. At that point, Neethya was already caring for 3 other children and the only other caregiver was her elderly mother who was too frail to care for all of them in her absence.

Sanctuary Care was contacted by Neethya's social worker to help find a respite carer who could support her youngest child, a cheerful 3 year old boy named Akash*.

After reaching out to Sanctuary Care, Akash was placed with one of our trusty respite carers, Roma* for one week. In that time, Akash continued to attend childcare while residing temporarily in Roma's home. The 3-year-old spent his time playing with Roma's daughters, trying new food and even learnt how to eat with a fork!

Neethya was initially worried about Akash's wellbeing but was reassured by the regular updates from Roma through pictures and videos of Akash. With the help from Roma, Neethya was able to seek medical treatment for her condition and Akash returned home to her a happy little boy.

Respite carers help families stay together in the long term by being a support system for parents in need. Will you take that step to create that impact by opening your heart and home to a child?
